# A brief guide for genealogists

## About Us:

The Office of Archives and Records is the official repository of the Archdiocese of St. Louis. We collect, preserve, and make available the historical records of the offices, missions, parishes, and schools of the Archdiocese. We welcome researchers and we provide access to our collections as permitted by the Code of Canon law, civil law, and conservation considerations. Please note that this is not a comprehensive guide to all of the collections in the Archives.

## **Sacramental Registers**

- Access: Records are open from 1930 and prior
  - Available on microfilm at the St. Louis County Library on Lindbergh <a href="http://www.slcl.org/">http://www.slcl.org/</a>
  - Available digitally at <a href="https://www.familysearch.org/search/catalog">https://www.familysearch.org/search/catalog</a>. In the catalog, search the author field for 'Catholic Missouri' to pull up all Catholic Churches in the state of Missouri. You can search 'Catholic Missouri [name of church]' to pull up that churches records. See the how-to video at <a href="https://youtu.be/SGaJvmY0ux0">https://youtu.be/SGaJvmY0ux0</a>.
  - o If there are gaps that the microfilm doesn't cover, feel free to contact the Archdiocesan Archives. Only archives staff may search and retrieve information from original registers.
- Types of sacramental registers:
  - Baptism and Marriage:
    - Best sources of genealogical information
    - Contain name, birth date, parents, godparents/sponsors, and baptismal date
    - Can also contain birth place, residence/address, other sacramental info like marriage, confirmation, etc.
  - First Communion, Confirmation, Death/Burial:
    - Less common and less biographically complete, but can have useful information.
    - May contain age, residence/address, parentage, confirmation name, cause of death/sickness, place of burial, etc.

#### **Catholic Cemeteries**

- Catholic Cemeteries Office owns 17 of 54 Catholic cemeteries
  - ALL their burials indexed at database at http://archstl.org/cemeteries/
- Individual parishes own remaining cemeteries contact them directly

#### **Parish Records**

- May contain: Priest appointments, historical boundaries, photographs, news clippings, parish
  history booklets, correspondence with Chancery (bulk is 1945-1985), administrative and buildings
  records (bulk is 1945-1985), special mass programs, artifacts, bulletins, etc.
- Check with us, but don't forget to also contact the open parish for historical information

## **Religious Sisters**

• Contact the religious order's archives. If you do not know what order the Sister was in, we *might* be able to help depending on how much information you can provide.

#### **Archdiocesan Priest Personnel Records**

- Access: Complete files are restricted
- *Holdings*: Archdiocesan priests only. If clergy was affiliated with a religious order, like the Jesuits, we will not have a file on him. Contact that religious order's archives directly.
- May contain: Vita or Appointment Card, photographs, obituary or memorial card, newspaper clippings

#### **Archdiocesan School Records**

- Grade Books and Rosters
  - Access: Records open 1930 and prior. Only city schools. The Archives does not hold all schools' records, nor a complete chronological run per school.
  - o May contain: Name, birth date or age, address, grades, and absences
- Historical records and photos: Check with us, but don't forget to also contact:
  - o The open parish or school
  - o The archives of the religious order that taught there
  - Alumni groups online

## **Orphanage Records**

- Access: Information open to researchers December 31, 1930 and prior. All records relating to an adoption fall under **Mo. Ann. Stat. § 453.121 (2011)** and the access restrictions outlined therein. Only archives staff members may search and retrieve information from these records.
- Holdings:
  - St. Joseph Home for Boys
  - o St. Mary's Female Orphan Asylum
  - St. Ann's Hospital and Foundling Asylum
- May contain: Child's name and birth date, date of admittance/separation, parent/guardian(s) releasing the child to the orphanage, family circumstances relating to admittance

#### **About Us:**

The Office of Archives and Records is the official repository of the Archdiocese of St. Louis. We collect, preserve, and make available the historical records of the offices, missions, parishes, and schools of the Archdiocese. We welcome researchers and we provide access to our collections as permitted by the Code of Canon Law, civil law, and conservation considerations.

#### **Catholic Communities and Parish Records**

Parish records contain priest appointments, historical boundaries, photographs news clippings, parish history booklets, correspondence with Chancery (bulk is 1945-1985), administrative and buildings records (bulk is 1945-1985), special mass programs, pins and ribbons, society rosters, and bulletins. When a parish closes, its records are transferred to the Archdiocesan Archives. If the parish is currently open, check with them for archival materials as well.

#### **Audio-Visual Materials**

The audiovisual collection consists of videos, films, reel to reel tapes, TV reels (16 mm), audiocassette tapes and DVDs. The Radio and Television Office opened in 1954 and closed around 1990. The office wrote and produced its own radio and television shows, such as the TV show *Quiz-A-Catholic* where laypeople competed in a Catholic-themed 20-questions-type game. ## Early Missouri Statehood, and French Influence, circa 1815-1843

Bishop Joseph Rosati, C.M. Papers, 1774-1990

These represent the working papers of Rosati while in St. Louis. The collection includes diaries, writings, and correspondence. The bulk of the papers cover the years 1816 to 1843. The correspondence describes missions and general life in the states of Missouri, Kentucky, Arkansas, the territory of the Louisiana Purchase, and more. The papers also include some biographical materials about Bishop Rosati. There is an annotated item-level index to the collection.

## Immigration Issues, Civil War, and Turn of the Century, 1843-1903

Unfortunately, most of the papers that would elucidate St. Louis Catholic life and perspective during this time period do not exist. Archbishop Peter R. Kenrick's successor Archbishop John Kain directed Kenrick's papers to be destroyed when Kain was appointed to the episcopacy in 1896. Kain also destroyed his own papers. The best resources for this period are in parish history booklets. See Parish Records above.

#### World War I Records, 1917-1918

*World War I Records* contain lists of Catholic men in the service. There is also some correspondence related to the war in the Archbishop John J. Glennon Papers.

## World War II Records, 1942-1980

World War II Records include correspondence with the Military Ordinariate (Archdiocese for the Military Services, U.S.A.), Apostolic Delegate, and military officials. Topics covered include commissioned chaplains, U.S. military bases at Fort Leonard Wood and Jefferson Barracks, and Prisoner of War Camps at Fort Leonard Wood and Weingarten. The Archdiocese actively missioned at the POW camps. Records on displaced persons demonstrate the large role the Archdiocese had in resettling refugees in St. Louis after the war.

Other records of interest for World War II research include the *priest personnel files* of wartime chaplains, which include reports, correspondence and photographs. *Parish records* may also have information about wartime activities.

## African American Catholics, Segregation, and Integration, bulk 1930s-1960s

There are scattered materials on the segregated missions for African American Catholics in St. Louis in the 1800s through early 1900s, but not much exists. The bulk of records that describe the "Negro Apostolate" from 1927-1946 are located in the *Archbishop John J. Glennon Papers*. The *Archbishop Joseph E. Cardinal Ritter Papers* contain correspondence regarding the integration of Catholic Schools in 1947, seven years before Brown v. Board of Education. The *Human Rights Commission Records* contain information about efforts by the Catholic Church to improve race relations in St. Louis from 1945-2008. Materials regarding these topics are also present in parish, school, and religious order records.

#### Second Vatican Council and Catholic Religious Trends, 1964-present

Vatican II addressed the pastoral issues being affected by social, political, and economic changes in the world. It resulted in major liturgical changes and focused theological perspectives on topics like ecumenism, native-language masses, and the role of laity in the Church. Both Cardinals Joseph E. Ritter and John J. Carberry participated in the Council in Rome. The archival records illustrate the kinds of changes that took place in the Archdiocese, and the religious trends that have continued through today.

#### Pope John Paul II Visit to St. Louis, 1999

A very large collection regarding the Pope's visit to St. Louis in 1999 includes planning information, publications, photographs, and artifacts from the event.
