# ST. Louis German social groups

Was your ancestor involved in an organized German social group? Considering the huge number of groups in St. Louis between the 1870s-1920, it's quite possible! Germans formed groups for many purposes and often carried out multiple activities within a single group. The most widespread types of organizations were:

- **Benevolent / protective associations**. Before insurance, pensions, unions or Social Security, such groups collected dues that would be distributed to members who met with misfortune. They also visited the sick and attended funerals. Such associations could be founded based on shared home region, skill or job type, and other factors. They strengthened their bonds with social activities.
- **Turnvereins**, or Turners. Germans gathered for group physical fitness, singing, and socializing (some Turner had taverns).
- **Singing societies**. These could be standalone organizations, or a sub-activity within another larger group.
- "Landsmannschaftliche" Vereins. These groups representing a specific Germanic region of origin might be purely social, or they might have a benevolent / protective function.

### **Research strategies**

Groups had officers, whose names were listed in publications by and about the group. Maybe your ancestor was one!

Even if you don't know German, be alert for these words in a document or newspaper article. They could be tips that your ancestor was involved in one of these groups:

Bund (Band) Verein (Union)
Gesellschaft (Society) Zirkel (Circle)

## Using city directories to research German social groups

Look for the "Societies" section, usually at the end of the volume. Many Germans belonged to "mainstream," national or international fraternal organizations (Druids, Elks, Woodmen etc.) These groups had numerous chapters and the larger ones have their own subheadings in the directory.

 Look for German-centric lodge names: Allemania, Concordia, Germania, Goethe, Harmonie, Humboldt, Lessing, Schiller, Teutonia – especially if your ancestor was living nearby

There were also national organizations that were formed specifically by and for Germans:

- Sons of Hermann mutual aid, founded 1840
- Harugari mutual aid, founded 1847
- o Allgemeiner Deutscher Unterstützungs Verein mutual aid, founded 18??
- Steuben Society of America –fraternal, founded 1919

Also try looking under Miscellaneous. Clues: words in the German language, German place names, or simply the word *German*.
