Frequently Asked Questions

- Where can I search for Korean War records?
 - The majority of unit, organizational, and operations records relating to the Korean War are held by the National Archives. When conducting your search, please have as much information as possible on the specific units or branch; this will aid NARA staff with locating the correct records.
- How can I search for Korean War records?
 - Searching for Korean War records may be done online using the NARA Catalog, Accessible Archives Database, or by requesting to view records in person at the nearest federal records center.
- What's the difference between unit records and personnel records?
 - Unit records are the chronological narrative of a particular military unit (companies, battalions, regiments, divisions, etc.) These primarily document major events such as engagements, reorganizations, attachments and detachments, and general movements. Personnel records are the files of individual service members. These will show the member's movements, promotions, transfers, travel orders, engagements, and units served.
- What websites should I use for my Korean War research?
 - o archives.gov: access the NARA Catalog and search for organization records
 - historyhub.history.gov: crowdsourcing website that connects public users to NARA Subject Matter Experts.
 - o aad.archives.gov: Accessible Archives Database is a search engine that can locate online NARA records quickly and sift out all non-digital NARA records.
 - o archives.gov/veterans: request individual Korean War veteran records.
